#### OVERVIEW OF COMMISSION'S KEY ACTIONS AND DECISIONS

#### Tuesday, August 8, 2017

#### I. PLENARY SESSION SUMMARY AND OVERVIEW

At the August 8, 2017 meeting conducted in Deerfield Beach the Commission considered and decided on Chair's issues and recommendations, Executive Director's announcements and discussions, product and entity approvals, applications for accreditor and course approvals, accessibility waivers, petitions for declaratory statements, and recommendations from the Commission's various committees. Specific actions included voting: 1.) To approve the meeting dates for the February 2018, April 2018 and June 2018 Commission meetings; 2.) To approve the 2017-2018 Annual Regulatory Plan as presented, and to authorize publication of the Plan by DBPR; 3.) To implement the changes to Rule 61G20-2.001 as presented by staff, authorize staff to make editorial changes as needed, authorize the Department of Business and Professional Regulation to publish a Notice of Proposed Rule, and to delegate authority to Thomas Campbell to sign rulemaking documents on behalf of the Chairman of the Florida Building Commission; 4.) To implement the changes to Rule 61G20-2.002 as drafted by staff with authorization for staff to make scoping revisions based on public and Commissioner comments; to leave the rule open and subject to comment for ten additional days prior to publishing the Notice of Proposed Rule; to authorize staff to make editorial and scoping changes as needed; to authorize the Department of Business and Professional Regulation to publish a Notice of Proposed Rule; and, to delegate authority to Thomas Campbell to sign rulemaking documents on behalf of the Chairman of the Florida Building Commission; 5.) To approve the Draft Workplan for development of the 7<sup>th</sup> Edition (2020) Florida Building Code Update Process; 6.) To conditionally approve the Energy Code Compliance Software update for the 5<sup>th</sup> Edition (2014) Florida Building Code, Energy Conservation, specifically Right-Suite Universal 2017 (using Right-Energy Florida 2014) for demonstrating compliance with residential building energy requirements for single-family houses, subject to addressing DBPR staff's and FSEC's written comments pursuant to the Energy TAC's recommendation; and, 7.) To approve funding the research projects for fiscal year 2017 - 2018 as recommended by the Committee of TAC Chairpersons on the basis that the proposed projects evaluated meet the definition of "research" and/or "technical enrichment", and are approved for funding based on the TAC chairs' recommendations, and staff administering and overseeing the research, and to charge staff with negotiating scoping and contracting as appropriate.

#### II. CHAIRMAN'S WELCOME

Chairman Browdy welcomed the Commission, DBPR staff and the public to Deerfield Beach and the August 8, 2017 plenary session of the Florida Building Commission. The Chair noted that the primary focus for the August meeting, in addition to considering regular procedural issues including product and entity approvals, applications for accreditor and course approvals, accessibility waivers, petitions for declaratory statements, and recommendations from the Commission's various committees, was for the purpose of: conducting rule workshops on Rules 61G20-2.001, Commission Organization and Operations, and 61G20-2.002, Statewide Amendments to the Florida Building Code, and deciding on funding of research projects for FY 2017-18.

The Chair explained that if one wished to address the Commission on any of the issues before the Commission they should sign-in on the appropriate sheet(s), and as always, the Commission will provide an opportunity for public comment on each of the Commission's substantive discussion topics. The Chair explained that if one wants to comment on a specific substantive Commission agenda item, they should come to the speaker's table at the appropriate time so the Commission knows they wish to speak. The Chair noted that public input is welcome, but should be offered before there is a formal motion on the floor.

Chairman Browdy explained that some of the licensing boards located within the Department of Business and Professional Regulation, have adopted rules regarding continuing education credits for attending Florida Building Commission meetings and/or Technical Advisory Committee meetings. ## V. June 13, 2017 Meeting and June 27, 2017 Teleconference Meeting Facilitator's Summary Reports and Meeting Minutes

**MOTION**—The Commission voted unanimously, 23 - 0 in favor, to approve June 13, 2017 and June 27, 2017 Meeting Minutes as presented/posted.

#### VI. CHAIR'S DISCUSSION ISSUES AND RECOMMENDATIONS

#### Appointments/Reappointments

#### **Commission Reappointment**

Chairman Browdy reported that Diana Worrall has been reappointed to the Commission by the Governor for a term beginning June 22, 2017 and ending February 7, 2021. Diana is the Commission's Persons With Disabilities representative.

#### TAC/POC Appointments

The Chair announced the following TAC/POC appointments:

**Energy TAC.** Jonathan Parks was appointed to the Energy TAC to replace Larry Maxwell who rolled off of the TAC. The Chair thanked Larry for his service, and welcomed Jonathan to the TAC.

**Roofing TAC.** George Ebersold was appointed to the Roofing TAC to replace Billy Cone who rolled off of the TAC. The Chair thanked Billy for his service, and welcomed George to the TAC.

#### **Residential TAC Formation Request**

The Chair reported that there is a request from stakeholders to form a Residential TAC for the purpose of reviewing and making recommendations regarding all code modifications to the Residential Building Code. DBPR staff is evaluating the request, and the Chair will keep the Commission advised regarding the issue.

#### Commission's Updated Milestones

The Chair reminded Commissioners and participants that the updated Commission Milestones document is linked to the August 8, 2017 Commission agenda on the BCIS.

#### VII. EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR ANNOUNCEMENTS AND DISCUSSIONS

Tom Campbell, FBC Executive Director, briefed the Commission on the following issues:

#### **BCIS Modernization**

The budget amendment shifting funds for the modernization effort has been submitted for approval. Budget amendments, for technology projects, need to be approved by the Governor's Office and the Agency for State Technology. Staff is waiting to hear whether it has been approved. If it is approved, ISF, the vendor who maintains the BCIS, will start modernizing the system a module at a time.

#### Implementation of Legislative Assignments

The electronic registry required by 17-139, Laws of Florida, (HB 727) is pending construction. ISF, the vendor who maintains the BCIS, was awarded the project. The registry will hopefully be live on the BCIS by September 22, 2017. Implementation for 17-029, Laws of Florida, (HB 741) is well underway. All jurisdictions have been notified of the reduction in the surcharge rate. The BCIS will be updated soon to reflect the reduction so that payments made for Q1 will be made at the 1% rate. The implementation will be complete by our next meeting in October. The next major steps for the implementation of 17-149, Laws of Florida, (HB 1021) are the rule workshops scheduled for today.

#### **Proposed Rule 61G20-1.005**

At the last meeting the Commission discussed developing rule 61G20-1.005 to incorporate legislative changes into the current version of the building code while rule 61G20-1.001 is occupied with the 6<sup>th</sup> Edition, Florida Building Code (2017). After further discussion with staff and legal it has been determined that a new rule really isn't necessary. The legislative changes have been posted to the BCIS and are available for enforcement (since statutes prevail over rules/the Code) and all necessary changes have been incorporated into the 6<sup>th</sup> Edition, Florida Building Code (2017), which is set to be effective December 31, 2017.

Justin Vogel, Accessibility Advisory Council legal advisor, presented the Accessibility Advisory Council's recommendations for all applications, and the Commission reviewed and decided on the Waiver applications submitted for their consideration.

#### 1. 1200 Ocean Drive Change of Use #210 - 1200 Ocean Drive Miami Beach 33139

**MOTION**—The Commission voted unanimously, 24 - 0 in favor, to deny the waiver due to applicant's failure to submit the required documentation.

#### 2. Pointe Parc Apartments #254 - 7524 Southside Blvd, Jacksonville 32256

**MOTION**—The Commission voted unanimously, 24 - 0 in favor, to grant the waiver, to the extent necessary pursuant to 553.509(c).

#### 3. Seagull Hotel #260 - 100 21 Street, Miami Beach 33139

**MOTION**—The Commission voted unanimously, 24 - 0 in favor, to grant the waiver based on economic hardship.

## 4. Delta Zeta Sorority Alpha Sigma Chapter FSU House Renovation #246 - 749 West Jefferson Street, Tallahassee 32304

**MOTION**—The Commission voted unanimously, 24 - 0 in favor, to grant the waiver based on economic hardship.

#### 5. Cabana Beach Club #178 - 619 Ponte Vedra Beach Boulevard, Ponte Vedra Beach 32082

**MOTION**—The Commission voted unanimously, 24 - 0 in favor, to grant the waiver based on economic hardship.

#### 6. 1895 Historical Downtown Stuart Home #259 - 311 SW 3rd Street, Stuart 34994

**MOTION**—The Commission voted unanimously, 24 - 0 in favor, to grant the waiver based on historic nature with regards only to vertical accessibility, not including accessible parking, door opening pressure and restrooms.

## 7. UPS Beacon Lakes #109 - no street address (Miami-Dade Folio No. 30-3935-000-0027), Miami 33182

**MOTION**—The Commission voted 20 – 4 in favor, to conditionally grant the waiver, conditioned on providing the infrastructure required to structurally support and power appropriate vertical accessibility equipment that may be required in the future.

#### 8. Centerra Townhomes #258 - 18000 SW 107 Avenue, Miami 33157

**MOTION**—The Commission voted unanimously, 24 - 0 in favor, to conditionally grant the waiver, on the condition that all doors openings requiring 29" be replaced with 32" nominal door openings.

#### 9. 1536 Jefferson Avenue #262 - 1536 Jefferson Avenue, Miami Beach 33139

**MOTION**—The Commission voted unanimously, 22 - 0 in favor, to grant the waiver based on the historic nature of the building.

#### 10. Abbey Hotel #257 - 300 21 Street, Miami Beach 33139

**MOTION**—The Commission voted unanimously, 22 - 0 in favor, to grant the waiver based on the historic nature of the building.

#### 11. Guest Floor Renovation #255 - 1131 Collins Avenue, Miami Beach 33139

**MOTION**—The Commission voted unanimously, 23 - 0 in favor, to grant the waiver based on the historic nature of the building, and technical infeasibility.

#### IX. CONSIDERATION OF APPLICATIONS FOR PRODUCT AND ENTITY APPROVAL

#### XI. LEGAL REPORT—ANNUAL REGULATORY PLAN

Justin Vogel reported that he was able to speak with the Department of Justice (DOJ) regarding the Commission's pending application for certification of the Florida Accessibility Code for Building Construction (FACBC) and DOJ indicated that they could only provide verification that the application was received, and nothing regarding the status of the application. The Chair requested that Justin contact DOJ monthly regarding the status of certification of the FACBC.

Justin Vogel reported that the Annual Regulatory Plan is a list of the statutory provisions impacting the Commission's duties or authorities, and indicating whether rulemaking is required in order to implement the provisions, and if so indicating whether a notice of development and/or notice of proposed rulemaking has been published, and the corresponding schedule.

Following the opportunity provided for questions and answers, public comment and Commission discussion, the Commission took the following action:

#### Commission Actions:

**MOTION**—The Commission voted unanimously, 20 - 0 in favor, to approve the 2017-2018 Annual Regulatory Plan as presented, and to authorize publication of the Plan by DBPR.

#### XII. CONSIDERATION OF PETITIONS FOR DECLARATORY STATEMENTS

Justin Vogel, Commission Legal Counsel, presented each declaratory statement in turn. Following are the actions taken by the Commission regarding the petitions for declaratory statements.

#### 1. DS 2017-030 by Angelo Rivera of Faour Glass Technologies

**Motion**—The Commission voted unanimously, 23 - 0 in favor, to approve the Product Approval POC's and Structural TAC's recommendation on the Petition (to approve staff's analysis as amended by the Structural TAC and Product Approval POC for Q 1).

#### 2. DS 2017-033 by Tatiana Gust of Elite Consulting SWFL

**Motion**—The Commission voted unanimously, 23 - 0 in favor, to approve the Plumbing TAC's recommendation on the Petition (to approve the TAC's recommendation on the Petition [to approve staff's analysis as presented for Q 1 and Q2).

#### 3. DS 2017-036 by Janice Littler Finseth of Structa Wire Corp.

*Motion*—The Commission voted unanimously, 23 - 0 in favor, to approve the Product Approval POC's recommendation on the Petition (to approve the POC's recommendation on the Petition [to approve staff's analysis as presented for Q 1).

#### 4. DS 2017-045 by Andrew C. Ask of Andrew C. Ask, P.E., Consulting Engineer

**Motion**—The Commission voted unanimously, 23 - 0 in favor, to approve the Energy TAC's recommendation on the Petition (to approve the TAC's recommendation on the Petition [to approve staff's analysis as presented/posted for Q 1).

#### 5. DS 2017-046 by Neil W. Hedrick of DALK Land LP

**Motion**—The Commission voted unanimously, 24 - 0 in favor, to approve the Code Administration TAC's recommendation on the Petition (to approve the TAC's recommendation on the Petition [to approve staff's analysis as presented for Q 1 - Q6).

#### XIII. BINDING INTERPRETATION #134 BRIEFING

Mo Madani, DBPR Program Manager, briefed the Commission on Binding Interpretation #140 that was petitioned regarding a Monroe County BO's interpretation pursuant to Chapter 1 - Scope and Administration Section 110.1, 105.4, 1804.4, and 1612.3. The issue involved a petition for a binding interpretation on the BO's interpretation regarding various provisions of these sections. Mo noted that the Binding Interpretation Panel ruled that they were without jurisdiction to rule on the request as the Petitioner does not have standing under the provisions of Section 553.775(3)(c), F.S. The Panel dismissed the interpretation request with no action.

Binding Interpretation #141 was petitioned regarding a Monroe County BO's interpretation pursuant to Chapter 16 - Structural Design Section 108.1, 108.2, 3103, 2224.2, 1616.1, and 2216.1. The issue involved a petition for a binding interpretation on the BO's interpretation regarding various provisions of these sections. The Binding Interpretation Panel ruled that they were without jurisdiction to rule on the request as the Petitioner does not have standing under the provisions of Section 553.775(3)(c), F.S. The Panel dismissed the interpretation request with no action.

#### XIV. RULE ADOPTION HEARING RULES 61G20-2.001 AND 61G20-2.002

Chairman Browdy indicated that at the June 13, 2017 meeting the Commission voted unanimously to authorize the Department of Business and Professional Regulation to initiate rulemaking for Rules 61G20-2.001 (Commission Organization and Operations), and 61G20-2.002 (Statewide Amendments to the Florida Building Code) for the purpose of incorporating Legislatively mandated Code amendments to the Florida Building Code, and to make necessary changes to the Commission's processes for developing the Florida Building Code.

**RULE 61G20-2.001.** Chairman Browdy indicated that the rule development workshop regarding Rule 61G20-2.001, Commission Organization and Operations, was for the purpose of conducting a rule development workshop regarding implementing the provisions of HB 1021 regarding amending the 75% supermajority voting threshold requirement for TACs' when voting on amendments to the Florida Building Code. This will now require a two-thirds favorable vote instead of the current three-fourths threshold.

The Chair noted that the workshop provided an opportunity for public comment before the Commission continues with rulemaking on Rule 61G20-2.001, Commission Organization and Operations. DBPR staff provided an overview of the proposed changes to the Rule prior to public comment on the same.

Following the opportunity provided for questions and answers, public comment and Commission discussion, the Commission took the following actions:

#### Commission Actions:

**MOTION**—The Commission voted unanimously, 24 - 0 in favor, to implement the changes to Rule 61G20-2.001 as presented by staff, authorize staff to make editorial changes as needed, authorize the Department of Business and Professional Regulation to publish a Notice of Proposed Rule, and to delegate authority to Thomas Campbell to sign rulemaking documents on behalf of the Chairman of the Florida Building Commission.

RULE 61G20-2.002. Chairman Browdy indicated that the rule development workshop regarding Rule 61G20-2.002, Statewide Amendments to the Florida Building Code, was for the purpose of conducting a rule development workshop regarding implementing the provisions of HB 1021 regarding some of the Commission's processes for developing the Florida Building Code. The revisions include providing a definition of "amendment", providing the purposes for which the Commission may amend the Florida Building Code, providing the process and requirements for submitting proposed amendments to the Florida Building Code, reflecting the two-thirds favorable voting threshold requirement for TACs' to recommend approval of proposed Code amendments, reflecting the favorable voting threshold requirement for the Commission to approve proposed Code amendments, providing the publication timelines for consideration of proposed amendments by TACs and the Commission, and the minimum timeline for when the Code can become effective after the Commission files the amended Code.

The Chair noted that the workshop provided an opportunity for public comment before the Commission continues with rulemaking on Rule 61G20-2.002, Statewide Amendments to the Florida Building Code. DBPR staff provided an overview of the proposed changes to the Rule prior to public comment on the same.

Following the opportunity provided for questions and answers, public comment and Commission discussion, the Commission took the following actions:

#### Commission Actions:

MOTION—The Commission voted unanimously, 24 - 0 in favor, to implement the changes to Rule 61G20-2.002 as drafted by staff with authorization for staff to make scoping revisions based on public and Commissioner comments; to leave the rule open and subject to comment for ten additional days prior to publishing the Notice of Proposed Rule; to authorize staff to make editorial and scoping changes as needed; to authorize the Department of Business and Professional Regulation to publish a Notice of

Proposed Rule; and, to delegate authority to Thomas Campbell to sign rulemaking documents on behalf of the Chairman of the Florida Building Commission.

**DRAFT WORKPLAN FOR 7<sup>TH</sup> EDITION (2020) FLORIDA BUILDING CODE.** Chairman Browdy indicated that DBPR Staff has prepared a draft Workplan for the development of the 7<sup>th</sup> Edition (2020) Florida Building Code Update process. Mo Madani reviewed the Workplan with the Commission and answered questions.

Following the opportunity provided for questions and answers, public comment and Commission discussion, the Commission took the following actions:

#### Commission Actions:

**MOTION**—The Commission voted unanimously, 24 - 0 in favor, to approve the Draft Workplan for development of the  $7^{th}$  Edition (2020) Florida Building Code Update Process.

#### XV. APPROVAL OF ENERGY CODE COMPLIANCE SOFTWARE FOR 5<sup>TH</sup> EDITION (2014) FBC

Chairman Browdy explained that at the June 19, 2015 meeting the Commission voted to approve Energy Code Compliance Software for the 5<sup>th</sup> Edition (2014) Florida Building Code, Energy Conservation, specifically EnergyGauge Summit 5.1 for demonstrating compliance with commercial building energy requirements and EnergyGauge USA 4.0.01 for demonstrating compliance with residential building energy requirements. At the August 18, 2015 meeting the Commission voted to approve REScheck for demonstrating compliance with residential building energy requirements. At the December 15, 2015 meeting the Commission voted to approve COMcheck for demonstrating compliance with commercial building energy requirements. In addition, at the February 10, 2016 meeting the Commission approved updates to approved Energy Code Compliance Software for the 5<sup>th</sup> Edition (2014) Florida Building Code, Energy Conservation, specifically EnergyGauge Summit 5.20 for demonstrating compliance with commercial building energy requirements. In addition, at the June 2016 meeting the Commission voted to approve updates to approved Energy Code Compliance Software for the 5<sup>th</sup> Edition (2014) Florida Building Code, Energy Conservation, specifically EnergyGauge USA 5.1 for demonstrating compliance with residential building energy requirements.

The Chair stated that the Commission is being asked to approve Energy Code Compliance Software for the 5<sup>th</sup> Edition (2014) Florida Building Code, Energy Conservation, specifically Right-Suite Universal 2017 (using Right-Energy Florida 2014) for demonstrating compliance with the residential building energy requirements for single-family houses.

The Energy TAC reviewed the Right-Suite Universal 2017 (using Right-Energy Florida 2014) for demonstrating compliance with residential building energy requirements for single-family houses, and recommended approval with conditions (pursuant to addressing DBPR staff's and FSEC's written comments) Commissioner Smith provided the Energy TAC's recommendation and Mo Madani provided any technical background needed and answered members' questions.

Following the opportunity provided for questions and answers, public comment and Commission discussion, the Commission took the following actions:

#### Commission Actions:

MOTION—The Commission voted unanimously, 23 – 0 in favor, to conditionally approve the Energy Code Compliance Software update for the 5<sup>th</sup> Edition (2014) Florida Building Code, Energy Conservation, specifically Right-Suite Universal 2017 (using Right-Energy Florida 2014) for demonstrating compliance with residential building energy requirements for single-family houses, subject to addressing DBPR staff's and FSEC's written comments pursuant to the Energy TAC's recommendation.

#### XVI. SELECTION OF RESEARCH PROJECTS FOR FY 2017-18 FUNDING

Chairman Browdy reported that the Commission has been funding hurricane resistance research based on legislatively approved spending authority since the formation of the Commission's Hurricane Research Advisory Committee in January of 2005. At the August 2013 meeting the Commission voted to expand the funding of research projects to topics beyond the scope of hurricane resistance research and to fund research into other Code related topical areas based on recommendations from the Commission's TACs and has done so since that time. For fiscal year 2017 - 2018 the TACs met during the Summer of 2017 to discuss research needs and developed recommendations for the Commission's consideration. Subsequently, the TAC chairs met on August 7, 2017 and developed recommendations for the Commission's consideration regarding the funding of proposed research projects.

Jeff Blair, Commission Facilitator, reported that at the Monday, August 7, 2017 meeting the TAC chairs considered and decided on whether the proposed projects met the three criteria for funding: 1.) definition of research and/or technical enrichment, 2.) urgency/immediacy, and needed for the 2020 FBC and/or legislative directive, and 3.) funding available (full or partial); and decided which met the requirements, and recommended them for approval by the Commission for funding based on the recommended priorities. The TAC Chairs' voted to recommend the Commission approve funding the research projects for fiscal year 2017 - 2018 as recommended by the TAC chairs on the basis that the proposed projects evaluated meet the three criteria for funding, and are approved for funding based on the funding levels recommended by the TAC chairs (\$398,983 total), and staff administering and overseeing the research, and negotiating scoping and contracting as appropriate.

Following the opportunity provided for questions and answers, public comment and Commission discussion, the Commission took the following actions:

#### Commission Actions:

**MOTION**—The Commission voted 20-3 in favor, to approve funding the research projects for fiscal year 2017 - 2018 as recommended by the Committee of TAC Chairs on the basis that the proposed projects evaluated meet the definition of "research" and/or "technical enrichment", and are approved for funding based on the TAC chairs' recommendations, and staff administering and overseeing the research, and to charge staff with negotiating scoping and contracting as appropriate.

#### XVIII. GENERAL PUBLIC COMMENT

#### Public Comments:

- Sara Yerkes, ICC: reported on the ICC schedule for publication of Code books for the 2017 FBC, indicating that they would be available in late August.
- Arlene Stuart, AZS Consulting: expressed concern that the provision in Section 553.990, F.S. allowing the use of an "approved third party" for conducting energy ratings was creating confusion and needed clarification.
- Mo Madani, DBPR: responded that the Statute and Rule provide clear guidance.
- Jim Schock, FBC: asked whether it would be possible for the Commission to approve third parties to ensure raters were qualified.
- Tom Campbell, DBPR: replied that unlike the Product Approval System, the Commission has no statutory authority to approve third party energy raters. Tom indicated that it would be reasonable for an interested party to submit a petition for a declaratory statement to seek clarification on the matter.
- Oscar Calleja, FBC: noted that he has been receiving calls with questions regarding the approved third party provision and that clarification would be useful.
- Dick Browdy, Chair FBC: stated that the reason that the approved third party provision was included was to ensure that there would be sufficient energy raters to comply with the blower door testing requirements that became effective on July 1, 2017.
- Drew Smith, FBC: noted that he has also been receiving calls with questions regarding the approved third party provision, and he agreed that clarification would be useful.
- Rob Vieira, FSEC: agreed that the issue needs clarification.
- Pete Quintela, Miami-Dade County: indicated that the qualifications for the certified building professionals who are authorized to perform energy ratings is clear; however, the "approved third party" raters have no similar state certification qualifications.
- Arlene Stuart, AZS Consulting: there is a definition of "approved third party" in other sub-codes such as the Plumbing Code but not in the Energy Code. The definition should be added to the Energy Code to provide the needed clarification.
- Larry Schneider, AIA: thanked the Commission for holding the August meeting in South Florida, and invited the Commission to hold meetings in the Region on a more frequent basis.
- Beverley Kennedy: indicated that asphalt is a hazardous material, especially at over 80 degrees, and that alternative and safer materials should be used instead.

#### XIX. COMMISSION MEMBER COMMENTS AND ISSUES

Chairman Browdy invited Commission members to offer any general comments to the Commission, or identify any issues or agenda items for the next Commission meeting.

#### Commission Member Comments:

- Steve Bassett: reported that the BCIS needed to be updated in all locations to provide the dates and locations for upcoming Commission meetings.
- Tom Campbell, DBPR: indicated that staff would review and resolve the issue as needed.
- Kevin Flanagan: asked about the Lightning Task Force that is scheduled to meet on February 12, 2018.
- Tom Campbell, DBPR: reported that staff was working on forming the Task Force and would report to the Commission at the October 2017 meeting.
- Jeff Gross: noted that he would be speaking to Broward County building officials regarding changes between the 5<sup>th</sup> Edition (2014) Code and the 6<sup>th</sup> Edition (2017) Code, and that the BCIS has excellent resources on the changes.
- Don Brown: noted that he enjoyed the long drive from the Panhandle to the Deerfield Beach Commission meeting, and that he would like to invite the Commission to meet on the beautiful Gulf beaches of the Destin/Fort Walton Beach area.
- Jeff Stone: was provided time on the Agenda to discuss his article (reThink Wood "Designing for High Winds") regarding using wood to design buildings for high winds. Jeff noted that he wanted to update the Commission in a public meeting and let them know about the article, and that he was looking for someone to translate the article into Spanish since he was presenting on the topic in Spanish speaking countries.

The October 10, 2017 meeting in Tallahassee will focus on the Commission's regular procedural and substantive issues, and rule development initiatives as needed.

## ATTACHMENT 3 FLORIDA BUILDING COMMISSION HISTORY AND OVERVIEW

#### **HISTORY**

Following Hurricane Andrew in 1992, Florida experienced record-breaking insurance losses resulting in a crisis affecting every homeowner in the state. The Governor appointed a Building Code Study Commission, The Florida Conflict Resolution Consortium designed and facilitated a two-year study and deliberation process with the 28 members representing a range of interests in the public and private sectors, through which the Commission evaluated the building code system.

The study revealed that building code adoption and enforcement was inconsistent throughout the state and even local codes thought to be the strongest proved inadequate when tested by major hurricane events. The consequences were devastation to lives and economies and a statewide property insurance crisis. The Commission recommended reform of the state building construction system which placed emphasis on uniformity and accountability.

The legislature enacted the consensus recommendations into law in 1998. In late 1998, the Consortium was asked by the Commission's chair to assist the newly created Florida Building Commission in its effort to build consensus for a uniform building code proposal. A complex consensus building process was put in place that included designing and facilitating meetings of 12 balanced technical advisory groups of 11 members each appointed by the Commission, as well as the Commission's meetings. The FCRC Consensus Center at FSU continues to work with the Commission by providing facilitation and consensus-building services.

#### **OVERVIEW**

COMMISSION REPRESENTATION. The Florida Building Commission is a 27-member representative stakeholder group who successfully created, implemented, and maintains the new statewide Florida Building Code. The Commission is comprised of the Chair, and 26 members appointed to represent specific stakeholder groups. They are as follows: four code officials, two state government representatives, a local government representative, a representative of persons with disability, a structural engineer, a mechanical engineer, representatives of fire protection technology, the building management industry, and the insurance industry, a general contractor, residential contractor, mechanical contractor, plumbing contractor, electrical contractor, roofing/sheet metal/air conditioning contractor, a manufactured building representative, a building product manufacturer, a swimming pool contractor, a representative of the green building industry, a natural gas system distribution representative, and a member representing the Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services' Office of Energy.

Consensus Process. The Florida Building Commission (FBC) seeks to develop consensus decisions on its recommendations and policy decisions. General consensus is a participatory process whereby, on matters of substance, the members strive for agreements which all of the members can accept, support, live with or agree not to oppose. In instances where, after vigorously exploring possible ways to enhance the members' support for the final decision on substantive decisions, and the Commission finds that 100 percent acceptance or support is not achievable, final decisions require at least 75 percent favorable vote of all members present and voting. This super majority decision rule underscores the importance of actively developing consensus throughout the process on substantive issues with the participation of all members and which all can live with and support.

The Commission's consensus process is conducted as an open public process with multiple opportunities for the public to provide input to the Commission on substantive issues. At each Commission meeting, the public is welcome to speak during the public comment period provided for each substantive issue under consideration, as well as general public comment periods provided at the end of each day's meeting. In addition to these opportunities for public input, most complex substantive issues before the Commission go through a consensus process where recommendations are developed by appointed representative stakeholder groups.

Since its formation in July of 1998, the Commission has demonstrated a commitment to working with affected interests to build consensus on complex issues. The adoption of the first edition of the Florida Building Code (2001 Edition), developed from September 1998 through January of 2001, involved 27 Commission meetings, dozens of facilitated public workshops and hundreds of TAC meetings. The Commission has consistently worked with all affected interests to build the best possible consensus-based decisions for the citizens of Florida. Through its committees and workgroups comprised of experts, the Commission has always developed its decisions based on the results of the best engineering and science available. Since 1999 the Commission has convened 64 special issue stakeholder workgroups to develop broad based consensus recommendations on issues of concern to stakeholders. Although the Code is by law a minimum building code, the Florida Building Code is the strongest consensus and science based building code in the country.
